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### Background

- More than 8,764 designated areas approved by the U.S. Treasury
- All 50 states, District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, Guam, U.S. Virgin Islands, American Samoa, and Northern Mariana Islands
- More than 2,000 counties and independent cities
- Uses of Opportunity Zones
  - Investors can defer eligible gains for federal tax purposes
  - Through Opportunity Zone funds
    - Renovate real estate properties
    - ♦ Land development
    - ♦ Invest in businesses
    - Operate businesses

## Purpose of the Opportunity Zone Census Tract Codes

Each Opportunity Zone is given an 11-digit code with the definition

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State County Census Tract Code

- Identify the area designated as an Opportunity Zone
- Tracking Opportunity Zone activities
- Tax reporting purposes for Opportunity Zone funds and investors

- Pick the state of interest
  - ♦ Example: Alabama
- Obtain a listing
  - ♦ U.S. Treasury
    - ♦ Raw data
  - ClearCompliance Group
    - ♦ Raw data (National, Regional, and States)
    - Categorized data (National, Regional, and States)
    - Categorized reports (National, Regional, and States)

- Select an Opportunity Zone Census Tract Codes of interest
  - ♦ Example: 01 001 020700
    - ♦ The first two digits of the Opportunity Zone census tract codes represent the State or territory
  - ♦ 01 = State of Alabama
  - Each of state has a two digit code
  - District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, Guam, U.S. Virgin Islands, American Samoa, and Northern Mariana Islands have there own two digit code and considered as States

- Select an Opportunity Zone Census Tract Codes of interest (cont')
  - ♦ Example: 01 001 020700
    - ♦ The second two digits of the Opportunity Zone census tract codes represent the County within the State
  - ♦ 001 = Autauga County
  - Each county within a state is assigned a three-digit code as part of each Opportunity Zone census tract code

- Select an Opportunity Zone Census Tract Codes of interest (cont')
  - ♦ Example: 01 001 020700
    - The final six digits of the Opportunity Zone census tract codes represent tract of land within the County of the State
  - ♦ 020700 = tract of land within Autauga County
  - Tract of land could include, but not limited to street blocks, major landmasses that have vacant or existing buildings

- Final read of the selected an Opportunity Zone Census Tract Codes of interest (cont')
  - ♦ Example: 01 001 020700
    - ♦ Code could be read as the Opportunity Zone is located on a tract of land (020700) within the Autauga County (001) in the State of Alabama (01)

### Closing Message

- ♦ 8,764 assigned Opportunity Zones within 50 states, District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, Guam, U.S. Virgin Islands, American Samoa, and Northern Mariana Islands
- Each Opportunity Zones census tract zone consists of an 11-digit codes
- Each Opportunity Zones census tract zone provides information about the state, county, and tract of land
- Provided steps to reading the Opportunity Zone census tract codes will help you better research and understand the zones
- Understanding the Opportunity Zone census tract codes helps you better plan for the area of interest
