BACKGROUND

- More than 8,764 designated Opportunity Zones approved by the U.S. Treasury
- All 50 states, District of Colombia, Puerto Rico, Guam, U.S. Virgin Islands, American Samoa, and Northern Mariana Islands
- More than 2,000 counties and independent cities



BACKGROUND

Uses of Opportunity Zones

- Investors can defer eligible gains for federal tax purposes
- Through approved Opportunity Zone funds
 - Renovate real estate properties
 - Land development
 - Invest in businesses
 - Operate businesses



BACKGROUND

- Opportunity Zones are active for 10 years
- Opportunity Zones became effective on December 31, 2018
- Opportunity Zone designations will end on December 31, 2028



- Figure out your purpose for researching an Opportunity Zone
- Determine whether you want to locate an Opportunity Zone(s) from a national, regional, or state level



Prep work - obtain the following information

- Listing of Opportunity Zones
 - U.S. Treasury raw data
 - ClearCompliance Group organized reports
 - Other sources



- Obtain the following information (cont')
 - Laptop or desktop with internet access
 - Smartphone (optional, but not best for viewing)
 - Website for the <u>Opportunity Zone map</u>
 - Notepad and pen/pencil or electronic version to take notes



Notes about the Opportunity Zone map

- Make sure you have Adobe Flash Players version 11.0 or greater installed on your computer or mobile device to access the map
- Reliable internet connection



- Notes about the Opportunity Zone map
 - Viewing options
 - Default Birdseye view of the area and Opportunity Zone based on most up-to-date satellite pictures
 - Grayed out buildings and streets
 - Major landmarks and neighbors are noted
 - Census tract codes are listed
 - Shaded blue area of approved designated Opportunity Zones with census tract codes
 - Major streets and freeways listed



- Notes about the Opportunity Zone map
 - Viewing options
 - Satellite Birdseye view of the area and Opportunity Zone based on most up-to-date satellite pictures
 - Detailed images of buildings, landmass, streets, freeways, natural landscapes, etc.
 - Includes buildings, landmass, streets, highways, water, etc. that are labeled



- Notes about the Opportunity Zone map
 - Viewing options
 - Streets shows map of streets, alleys, and parks shown with major parks, streets, and freeways identified.
 - No landmarks, buildings, etc. are identified or labeled
 - Opportunity Zone census tract codes are labeled
 - Use Satellite for detailed viewing



- Notes about the Opportunity Zone map
 - Viewing options
 - Bookmarks easier to locate territories outside of the contiguous U.S.
 - Contiguous U.S. Alaska Hawaii
 American Samoa Puerto Rico Guam
 Northern Mariana Islands U.S. Virgin Islands



- Notes about the Opportunity Zone map
 - Viewing options
 - Layers
 - Qualified Opportunity Zone Tract key option to select to help search for Opportunity Zones
 using the designated census tracts
 - County (No Labels) optional if you are looking to better see what county that the designated Opportunity Zones is located within a State
 - Congressional District (No Labels) optional if you are looking for public relations spin to help Opportunity Zones fund and area of interest
 - State key option to select to help search for Opportunity Zones using the designated census tracts



- Notes about the Opportunity Zone map
 - Viewing options
 - Blue shaded areas are the Qualified Designated Opportunity Zones "Qualified OZ"
 - I1 digit number is the identifier for the approved designated Opportunity Zones
 - **Example:** 00 000 000000
 - First two digits State
 - Next three digits County
 - Finally six digits tract codes



- Open the map
- Select "Arrow" icon to expand options
- Select "Layers" icon that is the first icon located under the "Arrow" icon
- Select "Qualified OZ Tract" and "State" to highlight Opportunity Zones and States on the map



- Select "Bookmarks" icon to add specific location such as American Samoa or Puerto Rico as these will help direct the map to your bookmarked areas
- The following features are helpful in finding Opportunity Zones
 - Pan or hand icon
 - Zoom in or magnifying glass with a '+'
 - Zoom out or magnifying glass with a '-'



- Using the Opportunity Zone map
 - Clicking anywhere on the map or a census tract number would pull up a summary of the qualified Opportunity Zones within the selected
 - Number of Opportunity Zones identified



- Clicking anywhere on the map or a census tract number would pull up a summary of the QOZs within the selected (cont')
 - List of QOZ tract numbers
 - Select the Opportunity Zone tract number
 - QOZ tract number
 - Yes or No to whether the tract number is designated QOZ
 - Yes or No to whether the tract number is NMTC Qualified



- Clicking anywhere on the map or a census tract number would pull up a summary of the QOZs within the selected (cont')
 - Select each of the viewing option to help get a better visual or structural and geography of the Opportunity Zones
 - Default Satellite Streets Gray Canvas



- Clicking anywhere on the map or a census tract number would pull up a summary of the QOZs within the selected (cont')
 - The following features are helpful in finding Opportunity Zones
 - Pan or hand icon
 - Zoom in or magnifying glass with a '+'
 - Zoom out or magnifying glass with a '-'



- Using the Opportunity Zone map
 - Clicking anywhere on the map or a census tract number would pull up a summary of the QOZs within the selected (cont')
 - These steps will get you started in researching the Opportunity Zones
